Without Lacks's knowledge, medical breakthroughs were made when her cells were used to create the first immortal human cell line (HELA) in the early 1950's. This is a case with social and bioethical concerns for every generation.

LETTERS FROM THE PAST

Among the many interesting objects in the Bristol Historical Society collection are letters from Bristol residents, some in extraordinary places. This a letter Milton Mozart Woodford (father-in-law of Louis Lee Beach, DDS) to his wife about his ship's brush with a reef during his service in the Civil War.

At Sea Oct 20th, 1861

My Dear Lina,

After being onboard ship for ten days we have finally got under way. Yesterday morning at daylight, I went on deck and found the fleet had begun to move. First a Man of War started out, then a gunboat, then another and another until it seemed as though there was no end to them. About ten o'clock they had all started but our ship and two others, and three or four gunboats, then it was time for us, so we got up anchor and started off in the wake to those that had gone before. The two steamships left about the same time and soon passed us as we had a large ship in tow, the gunboats bring up the rear. About ten o'clock PM we passed Cape Henry Light, and we could look out on the Atlantic and see the fleet stretching away before us as far as the eye could reach. The ships move in two lines and each one has its position and must keep it if possible. The gunboats go outside and around the line of ships. The weather is fine, and we are getting along very nicely. This morning when I went on deck the sun was shing brightly. We are out of sight of land, and it is a splendid sight to see the great ships plough and plunge through the foaming "white-caps". The water is a very dark blue and the tops of the waves white as the sun shines on them in the morning, it is beautiful! I wish you could see it! The wind is coming up this afternoon, I guess we shall get shaken up sometime tonight.

Thursday Oct 31st This morning we had a little excitement just to keep up our spirits. About three o'clock a gunboat ran across our bows and sent up rockets, Just then the pilot boat saw breakers directly ahead only a few rods off, We were in a rather unpleasant position, If we went forward, we should strike on the rocks; and if we stopped the ship that we were towing would run into us, But no time must be lost a the Captain rang the bell to "stop her" and "back her" which was done; but when we stopped . the ship astern didn't and when nearly to us she rose up on a big wave and with the bow sprit reaching way over our deck coming crashing down onto us, carrying away one of our smokestacks, smashing one of the surf boats and the railing of the ship and breaking things generally. Quite a number of the men were on deck, asleep around the stacks and they began to think they were come for. Things looked rather squally for a while but we soon got clear of the ship and went on our way rejoicing, minus one smoke stack and one boat, but thankfully there were no holes in our hull. There is a report that one steamer had run in among the breakers, but I hope it was not so

The captain says it is Diamond Reef off Cape Hatteras that we came so near It is a great question where we are going. Some think New Orleans, some to one place and some to another, but no one knows, unless it is some of the high officers, but we can all guess and I guess we shan't go below Florida. Time will tell. You have probably heard by this time that we have started, and now you will be all anxiety to hear what our port is. I wish I could think loud enough as you could hear. You would know where and how I am every hour when I am awake, and some hours when I am asleep. I hope when you do here, it may be good news.

MEMORIAL MILITARY MUSEUM

Students and teachers from St. Joseph School listened to World War II Navy Armed Guard veteran Dick Fitz and retired U.S. Army Colonel Peter Mack discuss their service on January 31st. The program was attended by 72 students, in the fifth through eighth grades. Mr. Fitz, 98, spoke about his dangerous missions protecting Liberty Ships as they delivered supplies all over the world to American Armed Forces and to allied countries. Colonel Mack served two tours of duty in Iraq from 2004 to 2005 and from 2009 to 2010, evacuating injured soldiers and performing reconnaissance. The students listened intently to the details and asked insightful questions. At the end of the program, Mr. Fitz said it was a "great honor" to talk to the children. After meeting and hearing from two veterans, children who had family members who served in the military left wanting to know their stories too.

The museum has established a committee to research "Bristol Women Who Served in the Military." The extensive initial research has focused on the 113 WWII Bristol service women. Yet by asking questions of friends and museum visitors, we have also learned names and details about Civil War and WWI nurses.

Dates in 2024 to Honor Military Women: Memorial Day: May 27

National Women Veterans Day: June 12

Armed Forces Day: June 29

Veterans Day: November 11

In WWI, Navy Nurse Corps had 1400 nurses on active duty. 19 died, half from influenza.

In WWII, 350,000 women served with the Armed Forces. U.S. Navy Nurse Corps 11,000 women and 57,000 in the Army Nurse Corps. As many s 543 died in war-related incidents including 16 nurses.

In Korea, 3,000 Army nurses, 4000 Navy nurses and hundreds of Air Force nurses saw action. Sixteen nurses lost their lives.

In Vietnam, nearly 10,000 women served, of which 90% were volunteer nurses. Eight American military women were killed.

Numbers inform; stories honor. We have just begun this project. Please, contact the museum to share the names of women who served in any time period.

We can also shared a book we recommend: "The Angels of Bataan and Corregidor," about 77 American military nurses who were taken prisoners of war by the Japanese.
