PROGRAMMING RECAP OF SUMMER PROGRAMS

In place of the regular Third Thursday programs for June, a Scavenger Hunt was held June 20th and June 21st. The Scavenger Hunt included museums and cultural institutions, public spaces and memorials, churches, historic buildings, businesses, restaurants, bars and coffee houses, bonus locations, public art and bonus point challenges. Our co-sponsor, The New Cambridge Project, located at 139 Center Street, was the site for the return of the finished hunts. The top three teams were the Skolcats, Two Holes and a Pole, and Mike & Grace.

Past President Maya Bringe's presentation on the Know Nothings in Bristol was well received by all those in attendance on Thursday, July 17th. The audience learned how the Know Nothings grew out of conspiracy theories, became the American Party, and flourished in the mid-1850's and how the Irish, although they endured suspicion and discrimination during the 1850s, survived and even thrived in later American decades.

Bob Adamczyk was the presenter for our Third Thursday, August 21st. The focus of the program was the Flood of 1955, which occurred 70 years ago. This memory of the flood's devastation in Bristol and Forestville was revisited with the screening of several photos donated to our collection by individuals over the years. After the screening, Bob spoke of Bristol's recovery from that point to June 24, 1957, when the Central Street bridge reopened and Bristol celebrated with a block party. To conclude the evening the audience shared their personal experiences and stories.

FALL THIRD THURSDAY PROGRAMS

Our **September 18th Third Thursday program at 7pm** will feature Adam Paul Heller of Norfolk, CT, one of only a handful of artisans in the country who still creates handcrafted gravestones. His story, "Monumental Devotion" by Janet Reynolds appeared in the October 2023 issue of Connecticut Magazine. Adam's program will focus on the historic evolution of headstone designs based on cultural changes and preferences.

As October is National Stamp Collecting Month, Steve Vastola's **October 16th Third Thursday program** will focus on the cancelled postage stamps that speared on the Peck letters. In the nineteenth century, the Peck family were prolific letter writers. Letters in general are considered primary source documents that historians and researchers covet access to. The Bristol Historical Society is lucky enough to have in its collection a handful of these letters penned by members of the Peck family, and what we can learn from them is absolutely fascinating. Steve will also take a look at the envelopes these letters traveled in, which tell their own stories. Topics touched on during this presentation will include the Lincoln candidacy, the Civil war, international treaties, how the mail moved in the 1860s, and Pre-empire Germany.

On **November 20th** our Third Thursday programs for 2025 will conclude. The speaker for the evening will be former Bristol resident, Matthew Crowley. His presentation will be on the copper mines of Bristol. George Bartholomew attempted to mine the copper ore deposits of Northeast Bristol and sold half of his shares to Andrew J. Miller, who managed the mine. The mine required dozens of unskilled workers and provided work for new Irish Americans. In 1850 it was the first industry in Bristol to recruit Irish workers. There were 100 men employed, and their presence prompted the first Catholic religious observance in 1847, when Rev. Luke Daly came to hear confessions and celebrate Mass. The Irish Americans represented the beginning of an ethnically diverse community, part of Bristol's emergence into modern industrial society. Copies of Matthew's book, *Miners and Grass Hands*, will be available for purchase.

For all fall programs, doors open at 6:30PM. Programs are free to members with a suggested \$5 donation for non-members. Additional parking is available behind the building.

No registration is required. Parking is available in the rear lot. Suggested donation for the event is \$5 for BHS member and children under 14 and \$10 for nonmembers.

The walk will be about 35 to 40 minutes long. Provisions can be made for those who want to join us on the Federal Hill Green and skip the hill.

MEMORIAL MILITARY MUSEUM

2025: The Year of the Woman programs featured a series of three spring programs and will conclude the year with two additional fall programs.

Bristol Salutes the Wallace Barnes Company Through the Letters of Lillian O'Connell will be on Saturday, October 25, 1:00 pm. Beginning with the first war orders, Associated Springs went into full war production eventually tripling its payroll from 2,000 to more than 6,000 employees. Springs and steel were needed for trucks, Jeeps, airplanes, grenade launchers, aerial bombs, machine guns, land mines, antiaircraft cannons. Yet the 1,166 employees in service were not forgotten. Fuller Barnes instructed employee Lillian O'Connell to "be closer in touch with [service members] while [they] are away." The live reading from the "Dear Girls and Boys" will give a personal view about "news from the plants, news about your friends at home, news about your friends in the service."

The Memorial Military Museum will host a **luncheon for WWII Women Veteran Families on Sunday, November 8, at 1:00**. The luncheon will be a recreation of a 1943 event hosted by Bristol Nurses War Council.

This year the Memorial Military Museum unveiled a special commemorative medallion honoring both male and female veterans. The medallion is a meaningful way to show support by remembering those who served. This distinctive medallion, priced at \$20, captures the spirt of military service making it a cherished keepsake for families and collectors alike.







Bristol Historical Society Reminds Members of Charitable Giving Opportunities

The Bristol Historical Society is almost at the 25-year mark of its occupancy of the City's first Bristol High School, and then later known as the Freshman Building. The renovation and re-use of this significant structure would not have been possible without the support of the membership – the vast majority of which faithfully continued to pay dues during the first years of renovations when the BHS hosted no programs or events. In the last 23 years, the BHS has also benefited from a \$200,000 grant from DECD to kick it all off and an aggressive grant-writing program. Over \$1.3 million has been invested in life safety, fire, ADA, roof, repointing and the lovely aesthetic interior renovation that has allowed us to rent the Main Event Room for a host of events, adding to our revenue stream.

While the Board of Directors recognizes this effort, the forecast for the future means that there is always an emphasis on encouraging giving during our Annual Campaign, to solicit one-time gifts, to ask members to include us in their estate planning and wills, and/or to name the BHS in IRA distributions, life insurance policies or donor-advised funds, based on what type of tax benefit or deduction would be beneficial.

And, please remember that we are available for rent for all kinds of events from bridal and baby showers to birthday parties, class reunions and post-funeral receptions.
