## PROGRAMMING RECAP OF SUMMER PROGRAMS

The September 18 Third Thursday program featured a most interesting presentation given by Adam Paul Heller who creates handcrafted gravestones throughout the world.

Steve Vastola's October 16th program focused on the cancelled postage stamps that appeared on the Peck letters. The Peck Family were prolific letter writers of the nineteenth century. In addition, Steve's topics also touched upon Lincoln's candidacy, the Civil War, international treaties, the 1860s mail movement and the Pre-Empire Germany.

The Fall Federal Hill Walking Tour originally scheduled for October 19th was rescheduled to Sunday, October 26th due to weather predictions. These tours have been proven to be quite successful each time they are held.

The last Third Thursday programs of 2025 was on November 20. It was a history of Bristol's Copper Mine presented by former Bristol resident Matthew Crowley. In 1850 the copper mine was the first industry in Bristol to have recruited 100 Irish workers and their presence prompted the first Catholic religious observance in 1847. These Irish Americans represented the beginning of an ethnically diverse community here in Bristol. Stop at our gift shop and purchase a copy of Matthew's book for \$15.

## INTO THE RIVER

On February 6, 1896, a railroad bridge over the Pequabuck River collapsed in Bristol, killing six and altering the lives of dozens more. As the 130th anniversary nears, a new historical initiative is bringing renewed attention to this forgotten tragedy through short videos and archival storytelling on Facebook on a page called *Into the River: the story of Bristol's 1896 Railroad Bridge disaster*. A comprehensive article will be published on **Friday, February 6, 2026**, in The Bristol Edition, followed by a live presentation featuring voice narration, video, and interactive media that explore the disaster and its victims.

## FALL THIRD THURSDAY PROGRAMS

Our 2026 programming begins in February and not January, usually due to unpredictable weather during the month.

We have scheduled a special program on Friday, February 13th at 7 pm. Doors open at 6:30 pm. This special presentation by Maya Bringe and Bob Adamczyk will focus on stories about "Love Gone Wrong!" PLEASE NOTE: This program will be the only one scheduled for the month of February.

These programs are free to BHS members with a suggested \$5 donation for non-members. Refreshments will be served.

For over a year, Bristol's America250 has been meeting to plan Bristol's celebration of the nation's 250th anniversary since the Declaration of independence. Now that 2026 has officially arrived, here are some events and places to keep up on them:

## BRISTOL SPORTS HALL OF FAME

The DoubleTree in Bristol was the setting for the BSHOF's annual Induction program held on Friday, Nov. 21, 2025. Before a capacity crowd of 360 guests, including friends and relatives, local sports legends Brian Archibald, Gretchen Chiasson, Tom Dickau, Andy Freimuth, John Greenleaf, David Hernandez, and Bryant Lishness were inducted for their roles in maintaining the tradition and glory of Bristol sports. Special thanks to the Nutmeg State Financial Credit Union for their sponsorship of the VIP reception held prior to the induction program.

Scholar athletes from Bristol's three high schools worked with BSHOF Directors Dave Mills and Mark Ziogas to create the inaugural Team Bristol 5K, a fundraiser which supports Team Impact, a national organization founded by former Bristol Eastern and Tufts football captain and BSHOF inductee Jay Calnan. Started a little over a decade ago, Team Impact matches children with life-threatening or debilitating illnesses with college athletic teams, providing them with the social and emotional benefits of sports. In its first year, Team Bristol raised \$4311 for Team Impact's mission through their 5K event hosted at Bristol Eastern High School on Oct. 19, 2025.

## 2025 LANTERN TOUR

The lantern tour returned to West Cemetery in 2025 with actors Bob Adamczyk, Ty Mellon, Jason Messier, Nicki LaPorte, Joe Pinette, James Donovan, Lisa Doyle-Bell, Jackie McCauley, Chris Ravlin, and Mel Bee, portraying some of Bristol's colorful characters. The event was co-sponsored with the Bristol Cemetery Commission. We would also like to thank the West Cemetery Association and the staff at the cemetery for allowing us to hold the event. As always, we also want to thank Bristol's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) for keeping us out of trouble, sending volunteers on tours, and generally helping us bring people the best - and safest - experience possible.

## MEMORIAL MILITARY MUSEUM

This past year, the Memorial Military Museum undertook a project that filled a long-standing void in Bristol's military narrative. For the first time, our community came together to recognize, research, and elevate the stories of Bristol's women who served during World War II. What began as a focused effort to uncover their contributions quickly became a transformative year of discovery, celebration, and remembrance. Our mission was clear: to ensure that Bristol's women who stepped forward during WWII were no longer absent from Bristol's story of service. Through a series of 5 programs, we honored these women in ways never done before: their names recorded, their stories written, their voices filmed, their photographs displayed, and their service shared with the public. And, for the first time, female WWII veterans from Bristol were honored with banners on Veterans Memorial Boulevard, standing proudly among the men who served.

One such program featured the story of Mickey Masterbone, one of Bristol's WWII female veterans who was still living and preparing to celebrate her 101st birthday. Determined to preserve her story while we still could, members of our museum traveled across the country to Walla Walla, Washington, to interview, film, and spend time with her. The resulting video became the centerpiece of our first major event, A Day of Honor, Remembrance & Community. Mickey's story captured the hearts of everyone who attended. Our year of programming concluded on November 9 with a Christmas luncheon, held in honor of Bristol's WWII women and their families. Descendants gathered around tables reminiscent of wartime holiday gatherings and shared in a homestyle dinner. Families who had never met one another found connection in shared history, and many learned details about their mothers, grandmothers, and aunts they had never known.

Through this past year, we accomplished a lot of firsts. We uncovered and documented dozens of Bristol women who served across all branches, preserved stories otherwise lost, highlighted their stories in our gallery, created Honor & Remembrance Medallions to honor all branches of service, and partnered with Veterans Strong to feature our female WWII Veterans on Banners along the Boulevard. What began as a commemorative project has become a foundational part of our mission. The Memorial Military Museum is proud to be the first organization to recognize the absence of Bristol's female veterans in our military history, to correct that oversight, and to honor them publicly. Their stories are now preserved—not just in archives, but in the hearts of our community. And this is only the beginning.
